

The congress was held at the Kazan Federal University, the second oldest university in Russia, in the centre of the city. It was said that it is impossible to hold such a congress nowadays, but despite all the difficulties in the process of organising it, as the participants wrote: "the congress was very meaningful, heartfelt, human and simply amazing". There was an atmosphere of unity. It was impossible and not even necessary to understand which of the participants was a person with a disability and which was an accompanying person.
